They eat parasites and lice that inhabit the elephant's skin, providing a service to keep the pachyderm healthy while enjoying a tasty meal. Thanks to Jung's



exceptional photography, the world can see just how special this "friendship" really is. The elephant appears to glance down, "thanking" his friend for his efforts.

In a fast-paced world where technology and science are rapidly progressing, these relationships show us how important it is to stay connected with the natural world. There's much to give and take from nature, and though we are humans, we must not forget that we are also mammals and just mere threads in the fabric of this earth. Our existence and relationship with our planet should be symbiotic, not one-sided."

Jung is quoted, "As a naturalist and a guide, I love educating people about these lesser-known interactions that are essential to keeping the ecosystem healthy and stable.
